What is the significance of Lent?

Early in the Church's history, the major events in Christ's life were observed with special observances, such as His birth, baptism, death, resurrection and ascension.

As these observances developed, a period of time was set aside prior to the major events of Jesus' birth and resurrection as a time of preparation.

During Lent, the Church's worship assumes a more penitential character. The color for the season is purple, a color often associated with penitence. The "Hymn of Praise" is omitted from the liturgy. The word "Alleluia" is usually omitted as well.

By not using the alleluia — a joyful expression meaning "Praise the Lord" — until Easter, the Lenten season is clearly set apart as a distinct time from the rest of the year.

Additionally, it forms a powerful contrast with the festive celebration of Jesus' resurrection when our alleluias ring loud and clear.

Finally, the penitential character of Lent is not its sole purpose. In the ancient Church, the weeks leading up to Easter were a time of intensive preparation of the candidates who were to be baptized at the Easter vigil on Holy Saturday. This time in the Church's calendar was seen as an especially appropriate time for Baptism because of the relationship between Christ's death and resurrection and our own in Holy Baptism (see Rom. 6:1-11).

This focus would suggest that the season of Lent serves not only as a time to meditate on the suffering that Christ endured on our behalf but also as an opportunity to reflect upon our own Baptism and what it means to live as a child of God.

St. Joseph

God promised to build King David a house. Centuries later, a carpenter, a son of David, welcomed into his home a woman pregnant with a child. The child was not of his own body, but still was the child of his heart. He welcomed the little carpenter, God in the flesh, who had come to build a true temple for God in human flesh and blood. Jesus was the name the angel gave, "for He will save His people from their sins." As Mary came nearer to term and the child grew in her womb, would Joseph place his hand on her tummy and feel the baby kick? Would he say to himself, "This is my Savior. This is the one we have prayed for and hoped for all our lives. He comes to set us free!"

Old Joseph didn't live to see how that redemption would take place. Scripture last mentions him in the temple with Mary and Jesus when the lad was twelve. Sometime between then and Jesus' Baptism at the age of 30, Joseph died. He didn't live to see the shame of the cross, when only Mary and her friends had the courage to stand by the Lord. He didn't live to see the triumph of the empty tomb when Jesus would begin spreading the joy of death's defeat into all the world. He probably never saw Jesus work a miracle, but that didn't matter.

Joseph died still full of faith and hope because he knew that God had come to be with us. He came to save us in that child, learning to walk and talk, embracing him, eating at his table and sleeping under his roof, playing with abandon and praying with glee. And so Joseph closed his eyes in peace and opened them in heaven's light only to be embraced by his child, his Jesus.

While on earth, Joseph had cared and provided for the child and now in heaven the child of Mary would forever care and provide for him – the child, his Jesus, had built a lasting home for his foster father, indeed for all who welcome Him into their lives.

Joseph lurks in the background. But how our Lord loved his earthly protector and provider! You probably know what Joseph felt like. We're background people too, for the most part. Maybe often overlooked and forgotten, just doing the tasks the Lord has given us to do. That's okay. There's One who doesn't overlook or forget, who loves us and is waiting to welcome us home. The child who was born of Mary, nurtured by Joseph; the child who by His cross and resurrection has built and opened wide for all who trust Him – great and small alike – an eternal home. FROM THE SCHOOL PRINCIPAL LENTEN OBSERVANCE

Matthew 21:1-9

Others cut down branches from the trees and spread them on the road. Then [they] cried out: "Hosanna to the Son of David!" (Matthew 21:8–9)

In the Name + of Jesus. Amen. They emptied the tree. They took what was pleasant and pleasing to the eye. It's almost as if they couldn't do anything else. It wasn't the branches that made them do it. It was the fruit. It was able to make them wise. That's what he said. The serpent seemed to be right, and "then the eyes of both of them were opened" (Genesis 3:7), and we all know the rest: Adam and Eve hid from God, were cast out of the garden, and were barred from the Tree of Life.

The crowd in Matthew 21 emptied the trees. They took the branches and cast them all over the road. "Hosanna!" was their cry. "Save us, Son of David!" They needed to be ready for His coming. Palm branches, the symbol of peace, were the pavement for a donkey, the animal of peace, who was ridden by Jesus, the Prince of Peace.

We want empty trees, as if His coming is dependent on our behavior. We do need to repent. Changing your behavior, putting away your icky deeds, isn't repentance. (Though you should stop all those things!) They are just fruits, signs of bad roots. Repentance is a complete change in heart, soul, mind, and strength—a change only Jesus, the Gardener of Eden, can do.


The point of Holy Week isn't the emptying of trees, isn't preparing Jesus' way. Holy Week is Jesus making His way, straight to the Cross, that He might hang upon the Tree for you. There He bears not only your bad fruit but rotten roots, too, being the most rotten tree and fruit ever in your place—"He became sin for us" (2 Corinthians 5:21)—to make you the very righteousness and perfection of God.

Repent of thinking you've got to empty trees to make way for Jesus. Holy Week is about His coming to fill a Tree for you and giving to you the fruits of His Cross: His water and His blood (John 19:34), His Baptism and Supper. Through these, the Spirit produces His fruit (Galatians 5), and grafts you into Jesus (Romans 11). The Tree of Life is yours because He filled the Tree for you. In the Name + of Jesus. Amen.

Almighty and everlasting God, You sent Your Son, our Savior Jesus Christ, to take upon Himself our flesh and to suffer death upon the cross. Mercifully grant that we may follow the example of His great humility and patience and be made partakers of His resurrection; through the same Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen. (Collect for Palmarum)



Catechetical Comments

A Series

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

This month we continue our look at The Close of the Commandments:

What does God say about all these commandments? He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." [Ex. 20: 5–6]

What does this mean? God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands.

Question 75: What prevents us from keeping God's commandments perfectly?

Our sinful nature makes it impossible.

The *Catechism 1991* answers the question: "What prevents us from keeping God's commandments perfectly?" by stating: "Our sinful nature makes it impossible." In support of this it lists the following Scripture passages:

Ps. 14:3 – They have all turned aside; together they have become corrupt; there is none who does good, not even one.

Eccl. 7:20 – There is not a righteous man on earth who does good and never sins.

Is. 64:6 – We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a polluted garment.

1 John 1:8 – If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us.

It also mentions the following Bible narrative: The apostle Paul grieved over his failure to keep the Law (Rom. 7:15-20).

Why does an apple tree bear apples and not pears? Why does a dog give birth to puppies and not kittens? We bear the fruit of what we are.

Apples come from apple trees. Puppies come from dogs. Sinners sin. In other words, we commit sins because we are sinners, and therefore we cannot keep God's commandments perfectly.

The truth of this is borne out in the history of our race since the fall of Adam and Eve into sin. We have all turned aside and become corrupt (Ps. 14:3), there is not a righteous man who does good and never sins (Eccl. 7:20), and we have all become like one who is unclean (Is. 64:6).

While many Christians desire to follow God's commands, we are inhibited by a sinful nature that does not want to. Our natural selves are just as prone to sin as are unbelievers. The only difference between an unbeliever and a believer in this regard – and it is a BIG difference – is that Christians have the gift of the Holy Spirit residing within them, motivating and strengthening them to resist temptation and to honor God.


But even this is imperfect. Despite the aid of God's Spirit, we daily sin much and surely deserve nothing but punishment. We know this to be true. As John writes: "If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves."

The more we understand this, the more grateful we become for the gospel, which is, after all, the ultimate purpose of the law – to show us our sin and our desperate need of a Savior. Thank God we have one: our blessed Jesus, the everlasting Son of God! 🕂

THE FAITH OF A CHILD

A moment from class during online teaching (18.1.2020)

Classes started back up January 11th. The first two weeks back at school were all online, since the city was in lockdown. Schedules always look a little different when we're online, but it's wonderful to see the students' faces and be teaching again.

One afternoon, my class of first graders and I had gathered, each occupying our own little box on the screen. After listening to their news of the day, the lesson began. Part way through, one of the students said, "I have to disappear for a minute. My brother fell and hit his head." She returned a few seconds later. The lesson continued.


A few minutes after that she said, "Miss Groshek, can you pray for my brother?"

We were in the middle of the lesson. It was towards the end of the day. But I asked her, "Do you want me to pray for him now? Or later?"

"Can you pray for him now?" she asked.

So, I asked all of the students to fold their hands and they all did, and in the middle of our English class, we prayed for her brother who had fallen.

In the Bible Jesus often told people -- adults -- that they needed the faith of a child. That simple faith that easily goes to God when they have a problem or a concern, quite respectfully, not worried about what anyone else might think. This moment in class today reminded me about the importance of having the faith of a child.





TALKING ABOUT THE GOSPEL

Helping with Bible class homework

Sometimes students ask for help with Bible homework, and it's always interesting to see what they're learning about and how the students are understanding what they're learning about, since the make up K.C.A. has both Christian and non-Christian families.

One of the questions this week was to explain the Gospel using the Roman's Road and also the story of the Thief on the Cross. I asked the student I was working with, "What is the Gospel?" And she replied, "The good news that we are saved by faith in Jesus." So we had a good starting point. :) We decided that the way to approach the question was to look at: the Romans Road, the story of the Thief on the Cross and also why it is relevant to us today.

People are sinners is the starting point for the Romans Road (3:23). The thief on the cross was obviously also a sinner. That's why he was being crucified and crucifixion was a particularly gruesome way to go. Today all of us are still sinners. Which means we all need a Saviour.

The next stop is God's plan for salvation (5:8). Jesus was on the cross next to the thief. Today, the Bible reminds us that Jesus died for all of us, for all of our sins.

The third point has to do with how sinners/we respond to Jesus (10:9-10). The thief acknowledged his faith in Jesus as the Son of God. Not only did he rebuke the other thief, but he also said to Jesus, "Remember me when you come into your kingdom" (Luke 23:42). Today we too can believe in our hearts that Jesus is Lord and share Him with others.

The final point in Romans talks about the results of this faith and salvation (5:1-2). Jesus told the thief, "Today you will be with me in paradise" (Luke 23:43). Today, we have God's grace and are able to approach God through prayer.

Towards the end, this student said, "You explained this very clearly. I should be able to remember it to write about for my homework."

Kyiv Christian Academy (K.C.A.) is a school that strives to educate students' minds and disciple students' hearts. It is a K-12 school with students from a variety of countries spanning the globe. Long tem! (E, sounds like the 'e' in 'red')



That is what people say in Krio when it has been a while since they have seen you or talked to you. So, I shall say, "Long tɛm!", and also, "Sorry!" since it has been a while since I have written to you about my life and work with Lutheran Bible Translators and the Mende Bible translation Project. That is why the format is more simple for this newsletter; I figure it is better to communicate now than to keep delaying in favor of being more fancy:D

Since the last newsletter, a lot of things have developed or changed. Through the end of 2020, the translation proceeded as it had before. I met with the translation team virtually for a few hours a couple times a week (5 or 6 am in Wisconsin and Ilam in Sierra Leone). We finished team checking Isaiah and 1st & 2nd Chronicles. In November, I was able to take an online three-week intensive course through a school in Jerusalem on the Book of Proverbs. This class allowed me to practice and improve my Hebrew and learn about different cultural, agricultural, environmental, and historical aspects of Israel that help give a better understanding of Proverbs and the Bible as a whole. During this time, I also applied for the Master of Arts in New Testament program at Biola University. I have been looking for some time for a fully online program that focused on either Greek or Hebrew and the New or Old Testament. Praise God, I was accepted into the program, which allows me to study regardless of the country I am in. I also received my advanced red belt at my martial arts school, which means I am one step (but over a year) away from being able to test for my black belt. A dream I had as a kid getting closer and closer to reality!

Now that you are caught up through the end of the year, here is the big news of 2021: I have returned to Sierra Leone safely! Last year I spent a lot of time going back and forth on whether I should go back to Sierra Leone while the pandemic continues and deciding IF I go back WHEN I should go. To say my mind went in circles is, indeed, an understatement. Ultimately, I decided to return after the holidays, so I left for Sierra Leone on January 11th and arrived on the 12th. Since so many plans for people around the world have been quickly changed, I wasn't sure the best time to say, "I am going back!", and I waited so long that I now have to say, "I'm back!" Thank you for your understanding of my belated communications.

Because Sierra Leone required a negative PCR Covid-19 test within 7 days of travel, I had already taken one test when I learned I would need a test within 3 days of transiting through France. Because of this new information (which thankfully came before the three hour drive to Chicago), I took another PCR test at a site that said results usually came back in 2 days. While I was finishing that test my mom called to direct me to a place that had antigen tests with results within 15 minutes. Thankfully antigen tests were accepted for transiting through Paris, because the second PCR test arrived while I was already on the plane there!

When I arrived in Sierra Leone, we had to fill out a few forms, go through immigration where they kept our passports (there had already been official communication from the government, so I wasn't surprised to pass it over). Then we collected our bags and signed-in to receive two more Covid tests. One was a rapid test, so if it was positive they could keep you quarantined at a local hotel, and the other was a PCR test, so they had more accurate results whether your original results were positive or negative. Upon receiving confirmation of your positive PCR test a few days later, you could then go collect your passport from the capital. Fortunately, another missionary who lives near Bo was able to pick up my passport for me (I think I owe her pizza or cookies for waiting for so long). This allowed me to go right from the airport to Bo after staying for one night. Thankfully, my friend Bethany had checked on my house and Kiddo the dog to make sure everything was working and called the apartment manager if anything needed fixing. This made my first few days home so much easier!

After one week of unpacking, cleaning, and recovering from jet lag, I returned to the translation office! Working from home was not my best skill, but now that I am in the office again working with the translators in person I am already working better. I thank God for the opportunity to work from home while in the US, connecting with the translators virtually, but I am happy now to have an office to go to where I can shift my mind from home to work. I suppose that is why I am finally writing to you even when I have more things to do with school and work. We are currently working on proofreading Lamentations, so it is ready for the reviewers to read through, and then we will begin team checking Jeremiah. Jeremiah, and then Ezekiel, will take some time and energy because of their length and their poetic way of prophesying. Thank God for translators who take on the task of translating poetry; I am thankful for the being an advisor without the challenge of actual translating.

At this time, I am also beginning to assist another local language translation project, called Themne, located in the city of Makeni, three and half hours away. My colleagues, who were with the team full time, are now located in the United States, so I will just visit the Makeni office for short trips for any questions or challenges they have, as well as to sit in on a few team checking sessions.

Please pray for health and safety, wisdom and perseverance in the translation work, and diligence for my schoolwork.

I am so grateful for all of you as you continue to prayer, support, and encourage me through this important work. Thank you!

One of the great joys of being Dean of Chapel is gathering with members of the choir as they practice both Kiswahili and English hymns for services in the chapel. There is no way I can adequately express both the quality of their singing and the beauty of their voices. Yet, there is one thing I can say. These men and women are committed to singing the faith into the ears of those who hear them.

In addition to singing in chapel, one of the goals of the Matongo Seminary Choir is to assist the local Kenyan Lutheran congregations in learning *Ibada Takatifu* (the hymnal of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Kenya). Since Kenya is a land of many peoples and many languages, this hymnal helps to unite the Lutherans here, as they sing and worship in their national language—Kiswahili. So, on selected weekends, they travel to local congregations to sing and to help them appreciate this wonderful resource.

Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the message that is proclaimed. As pastors preach the Word of God from the pulpit, so the choir sings words which "preach" in such a way that the words sink deep into the mind and heart. Both pure and impure messages can be sung. And it is such a joy to know that these students want to be faithful to the truth of Holy Scripture.

As Dean of Chapel, I also work closely with the men who lead the services in the chapel and with those students who begin the task of learning how to preach and teach the Faith. Many of these men also have responsibilities in congregations in the villages, so it is extremely important that they learn well how to lead the services and to clearly proclaim both Law and Gospel in their sermons.

TRINITY LUTHERAN LADIES AID/LWML YEAR 2020 IN REVIEW

WHAT IS OUR PURPOSE

Despite the pandemic that has plagued our world, our ladies group has continued to function with the help of our Almighty God. He has allowed us to 'think outside the box' and fulfill our motto "Serve the Lord with gladness." Psalm 100:2

Beginning last spring, six of our Ladies of Trinity Menasha sewed and distributed over 500 homemade face masks to assisted living facilities, hospice facilities, Trinity Family, friends and family. This project has continued on a smaller scale throughout the year.

During the summer months and early fall we began our Lutheran World Relief campaign. Trinity Congregation was invited to contribute to the school and health kit items that were compiled and ultimately sent all over the world. Along with the 85 school kits and 100 health kits we sent 50 beautiful handmade quilts. Thank you to the many Trinity members who donated items as well as cash donations to support our World Relief Drive and shipping costs.

Our dedicated quilting ladies have managed to continue most of the year on a weekly/biweekly basis and at home. Besides the World Relief quilts, they have delivered the following to Pillars (the homeless facility in Appleton): 134 handmade quilts, 26 blankets, 91 sheets, 215 pillow cases, 14 towels, and 5 pillows. The Clothes Closet received 21 quilts, 1 blanket, 25 sheets and 8 pillow cases.

We were able to celebrate LWML Sunday in October with the guidance of Pastor Billings creating a beautiful bulletin and delivering a very meaningful sermon. Our faithful banner ladies created a new LWML banner 'Kingdom people produce KINGDOM FRUIT.' that was displayed. We were able to gather after the service for a few pictures and short fellowship time.

Also in October and November, we advertised a 'Call to Order Bake Sale' within our Trinity Congregation. As we were not able to have the fall Trinity Craft Fair we wanted to be able to financially support our missionaries and Trinity Church and School projects as we have in the past years. We were delighted with the many orders we received and ended with proceeds of \$1992. A heartfelt "thank you" to all who placed orders.

A most joyous event of the year was to assemble and deliver Christmas Cheer baskets to 30 Trinity households of elderly and shut ins. We also gave personal gifts to 7 others who reside in assisted living and skilled nursing facilities. Personally delivering these baskets and gifts brought much joy to our ladies with our ultimate goal being to bring joy and love to our recipients.

January of each year is our time to share what we have for mission work as well as to support Trinity needs and projects. Our monies to share were less this year because of the pandemic but we were still blessed to be able to do something.

We have tried very hard to communicate with each other as well as members of the congregation, especially during the challenging year. We feel it very vital to keep in touch with phone calls as well as cards of support and caring.

Our group is active with Zone 11 of the South Wisconsin District of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League. Betsy Meverden just retired from the presidency position after 10 years of service and Jane Stier serves presently as the treasurer of the zone. Dottie Kraus also serves on the Bd of Directors. Mites are collected and are used to fund grants for projects and needs all over the world. Our present South Wisconsin District goal for the 2020 – 2022 biennium is \$205,000. 

Skilled nursing facilities and assisted living facilities, where several of our members reside, were contacted to determine what may be on these folks wish lists; we were surprised and thrilled to hear they had an answer for us, which for most individuals came right from our members. Personal gifts of slippers, coffee, scarf and gloves, sweatpants, a Peanuts Gang sweatshirt, Honey buns, a novel, and a cardinal lamp were purchased just for them. On December 15th, the ladies assembled the baskets which overflowed so much that all the items did not fit. Pastor GeRue came to help and even had a few items to add. It was a joy to watch the ladies gathering the items for the deliveries they had chosen to make. Our devotion that evening was about the joy of the personal touch that happens when we show love and caring for people in our lives.
