

# Wellness Plus Programs Winnebago County Public Health

Stepping On is a falls prevention class that has been proven to reduce falls by 30%. This interactive class will help you recognize your risk of falling and help you build the balance, strength, and practical skills needed to avoid a fall. This small group class is led by 2 trained facilitators and meets for 2 hours once a week for 7 weeks. It is geared towards adults over 60, adults who have fallen in the past year or have a fear of falling. During the class, you will meet with a physical therapist, vision specialist, pharmacist, and community safety specialist who help you gain confidence to stay active in your community and do the things you want to do.

Thursday, May 13<sup>th</sup> the congregations of our Circuit will gather to celebrate the Ascension of Our Lord. The service will take place at 7:00 P.M. Peace Lutheran Church, 1228 S. Park Avenue, Neenah, WI; will serve as host. Pastor Phil Enderle, Pastor at Hope, Fond du Lac, will be our guest preacher. Pastors of our Circuit congregations will be participating in the service. There will **not** be a Mass Choir. A small choir of members of Peace will provide special music.

The offering will be presented to the Lord as a part of the service, and given to support the ministry of The Rev. Dr. Fungchatou Lo, his wife Dr. Kalia Lo and their adopted son, Mercy, who serve as missionaries. Here is a brief description concerning the nature of their work:

The Rev. Dr. Fungchatou Lo, his wife Dr. Kalia Lo and their adopted son, Mercy, serve as missionaries. Because of COVID they are back on an extended furlough living in the Twin Cities. They were able to leave Chaing Mai, Thailand just before Christmas 2020.

Online teaching has continued in 2021 and more sessions are being planned. Hundreds of baptisms and new members have resulted. In 2020 there were 310 baptisms. In the first four months of 2021 the pastors and churches have reported over 200 baptisms. COVID cannot stop God's Kingdom from expanding.

Your financial gifts and support along with your prayers will provide funding for more online training. The Hmong believers are hungry for solid Bible based teaching. Thank you.

**In reference to Masks**... Because of continuing concerns, though not mandated, they are highly encouraged to be worn. Social distancing is also in place. Hand sanitizer and masks for those who might not have one and prefer to wear one, will be provided as you enter the building.

# Stewardship Talk

I have been a member here all my life and been involved in a variety of activities over the years, but until I started helping out with our Food Pantry a few years ago, I didn't have any idea of how it really worked. I knew that many faithful members of our congregation and from Peace in Neenah regularly donated money & food, our family would be sure to bring food for the Holiday food collections, but I never thought about the logistics of how the food is distributed to the people that need it. I also had *no idea* how much of an impact this ministry would have on me and my faith walk.

Here are a few of the things I have learned:

The people who use Trinity's Food Pantry are people of all ages and backgrounds... some are members of either Trinity or Peace congregations, but the majority are people from our community. Whether they're working but can't make ends meet, unemployed or suffering from an illness or disability, our Food Pantry is here to help. We serve anyone who comes, we don't ask a lot of questions when they register, just their name so we can keep track of how many packages we need to prepare twice a month. It's a great feeling to know that I am part of the ministry that helps make life a little better for them. I'm reminded of the Bible verse from Matt 25:35... For I was hungry, and you fed me. I was thirsty, and you gave me a drink.

Many times, people are embarrassed to be receiving a handout. Although we welcome anyone in need, there can be an underlying element of shame for those who come. I always try to keep in mind 1 Peter 3:8 ... Finally, all of you should be of one mind. Sympathize with each other. Love each other as brothers and sisters. Be tenderhearted and keep a humble attitude. I make sure to greet each person with a smile and make them feel welcome, to reassure them that they are not a burden, and we are happy that we can help them. I remember one sin-

gle mother who had lost her job telling me, while holding back tears, how difficult it was to be accepting food because she and her kids had always *donated* to local Food Drives and the homeless shelter—she never



thought that she would be in a situation where she would be receiving food from a Food Pantry. There are a

few people I've gotten to know pretty well, who stay in contact with me outside of Food Pantry distribution days, people that God has put in my life to love and encourage, and to teach me compassion and patience.

We also have a lot of helpers. From those who faithfully donate food, money, or bring in extra produce from their gardens, sort food and stock shelves, especially after a Food Drive like the Postal Workers Spring Food Collection— to the faithful crew that comes every 2<sup>nd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> Saturday morning to stuff the 40 or more boxes and bags full of goodies and then brave all kinds of weather to help with the "Drive-thru" distribution in our back parking lot. As it says in **Ephesians** 4:16...He makes the whole fit together perfectly. As each part does its own special work, it helps the other parts grow, so that the whole body is healthy and growing and full of love.

My favorite thing about working for the Food Pantry are the connections I've made with both our patrons and fellow workers and for the friendships that have grown while sharing God's love and provision in a tangible way. What a blessing it is to be a part of this ministry!

# FROM THE PRINCIPAL



"The King, the Throne, and the Kingdom" Text: Acts 1:1-11; Luke 24:44-53

Alleluia! Christ is ascended! [He is ascended indeed! Alleluia!] Alleluia!

The hymns that we sing for the Ascension of Our Lord are not only filled with joy, but also have a certain stately, royal quality to them. As is meet and right. As is befitting an inauguration or a coronation. Something significant is happening, and the music reflects that.

For the Ascension of Our Lord is the occasion of His enthronement, the coronation of Jesus on the throne of God in heaven. Notice, though, that I did <u>not</u> say the enthronement or coronation of the Son of God - that place on the throne, that place at the Father's right hand, was always and rightly the Son's. But the Son of God came down from heaven and was incarnate, or as we confess in the Creed, *He was made man*. And not just for a little while, using a human nature for a while and then

throwing it away when He was done with it - but forever. The Son of God and our human nature have been permanently and inseparably united in the man Jesus. And so in His Ascension, it is not just Jesus' divinity but also His human nature - <u>our</u> human nature - that is seated at the right hand of God the Father Almighty. What Adam gave up, Christ has restored. What Adam cast down in shame, Christ has lifted up in glory.

Which means that is our brother there, at the right hand of the Father, on the throne of God, ruling all things for our good. And that's definitely a reason to celebrate and rejoice this night.

And the disciples seem to get that. We hear in Luke, that after watching Jesus ascend, the disciples returned to Jerusalem *with great joy*! They weren't sad that their friend and Master left them, they were overjoyed that His rule and authority would continue.

So with that in mind, this royal enthronement and coronation, they ask Jesus: Lord, will you at this time restore the kingdom to Israel? I think we usually dismiss that question, thinking that the disciples still don't get it! They're still thinking wrongly and about an earthly kingdom. Maybe. But notice that Jesus doesn't scold them or disagree with them. He would have if He thought it necessary. He had before. But Jesus doesn't say No! I'm not restoring the kingdom to Israel! He says this instead: it is not for you to know the times or seasons. Or in other words, He is restoring the kingdom to Israel, but the when - don't worry about that. Instead, He tells them the how. He says: But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth.

The disciples were anxious to see Jesus finish what He started. And they will! And we will. As Jesus continues His work from His throne through the Holy Spirit which He gives to His Church, the *new* Israel. The *old* Israel was an earthly nation and had its time and place and purpose. But that's not the Israel Jesus will restore. Jesus made all things new through His death and resurrection, so it is a *new* Israel that He is now restoring, a spiritual nation, not limited by time or geography, but including peoples of all times and places - past, present, and future.

And this restoring will now take place through them, these disciples now apostles. These followers turned sent ones. Sent out into the world. *To the ends of the earth*. And through their preaching, the kingdom will be restored and grow, for the Spirit will work through that Word. And so just as when Jesus was with them, the preaching will go on, the forgiving will go on, the baptizing will go on, and the feeding will go on, but now through them. Their now-enthroned Lord working through them by His Spirit. When they speak, He speaks. When they forgive, He forgives. When they baptize, He baptizes. When they give Jesus' Body and Blood, Jesus is giving His own Body and Blood, just as He did on the night He was betrayed. And in this way, yes, the disciples were quite right - Jesus is restoring the kingdom to Israel.

So while the disciples could see their Lord no longer - for when He ascended, we are told, *a cloud hid Him from their sight* - they *could* see Him working; they could see the results. It's like if I come home from work and see the table set and a wonderful dinner laid out on it - I didn't see my wife do all that work, but I see the results; I know she did. So, too, with Jesus' work now. We see people coming to faith and sustained in their faith. Little children, old folks, people from all walks of life, countries, cultures. I didn't see Jesus do it, but I know He did. Where His Word is preached, people hear. And where people hear, they are baptized. And where they are baptized, they are absolved. And where they are absolved, they are fed. And where all this happens, there is the church, the new Israel. Jesus promised it would be so.

And the apostles see this right away. Ten days after Jesus' Ascension He sends them the Holy Spirit, just as He promised, and Peter and the eleven preach, and people hear. And hearing, they are baptized. Over 3,000 souls that very first day! And the apostles see the kingdom being restored. A new Israel growing. And it wasn't *because* of them, but *through* them Jesus was still working. Same as He always was, only now even more, even greater.

And so it will be until we finally do see Jesus again, as the angels told the disciples: *This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven*. *Then* we will see Him. Now, we do not. But we see the signs of His work; the results of His work. Maybe not 3,000 at a time now, but just one soul at a time. But that's enough. Remember what Jesus said: *there is joy before the angels of God over one sinner who repents* (Luke 15:10).

It's easy to doubt though, when we see the Church persecuted, when we see her divided and struggling, when we see the Bride of Christ scorned and mocked, when we see the Church marginalized and her sons and daughters martyred. Enthronement, coronation, seem so very different from the reality we see. But that's how it is with life under the cross. For we have not yet ascended.

But as the Collect for the Ascension says, we ascend in heart and mind. We see the cross of Jesus and the cross now, but we also see through the cross to the reality that is, for now, unseen. And know that through the cross, the kingdom is being restored. The new Israel is growing. The kingdom is advancing. Led by Jesus, at the right hand of the Father, through His Spirit, by His Word and Sacraments given all over the world. Given here, to you. That you be and remain a part of this new Israel, until Jesus comes again to take you to His glory. And He will, for He didn't ascend for Himself, but for you. To rule for you, yes. But also this: that your human nature be where His human nature is, forever. That just as He is risen from the dead and lives and reigns to all eternity, so shall you. With Him.

That's why the disciples returned to Jerusalem with great joy, and that's why our joy, too, this night. For *Christ is ascended!* [He is ascended indeed! Alleluia!] And <u>we</u> have been clothed with power from on high! The kingdom is being restored! Amen.



# Catechetical Comments

A Series

### THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

This month we continue our look at The Close of the Commandments:

What does God say about all these commandments? He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." [Ex. 20: 5–6]

What does this mean? God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands.

Question 77. What purposes does the Law then serve?

A. First, the Law helps to control violent outbursts of sin and keeps order in the world (a curb).

The *Catechism 1991* begins to answer the question: "What purposes does the Law then serve?" by saying: "What purposes does the Law then serve?" In support of this it lists the following Scripture passages:

**1 Tim. 1:9** – Understanding this, that the law is not laid down for the just [good people] but for the lawless and disobedient, for the ungodly and sinners, for the unholy and profane, for those who strike their fathers and mothers.

Rom. 2:14-15 — For when Gentiles, who do not have the law, by nature do what the law requires, they are a law to themselves, even though they do not have the law. They show that the work of the law is written on their hearts, while their conscience also bears witness, and their conflicting thoughts accuse or even excuse them.

The so-called "Three Uses of the Law" are, as we shall see, well founded in Scripture. In short, they are: a "curb," a "mirror," and a "guide." This month we take up the first of these uses in looking at the law of God as a curb.

First of all, what is a curb and what does it do? A curb is a kind of boundary; it sets limits. A curb says, "Thus far you may go and no farther."

This can easily be seen in our common use of the term. A curb on a street or roadway discourages the transgression of a boundary. It doesn't entirely prevent such a transgression, but jumping the curb can only be done at risk to the vehicle in which you happen to be riding or driving, not to mention those on the other side of that curb.

The curb doesn't really come into play unless you transgress it. As Paul writes to Timothy, "The law is not laid down for the just but for the lawless and disobedient" (1 Tim. 1:9). If you drive within the boundaries, you never need concern yourself with the curb. Good drivers never worry about – or even spend energy thinking about – curbs. They simply stay within the lines and never even encounter the curb.

Driving instructors don't spend a lot of time discussing curbs. They don't need to. For the average driver it simply makes sense that the curb is there to prevent them going where their vehicle doesn't belong. As Paul says to the Romans, "They show that the work of the law is written on their hearts" (Rom. 2:15).

To those whose consciences are vibrant and active, the curb of God's law can be just as obvious as that one beside the road. Transgressing it is risky as well, damaging to both the transgressor and his/her victim.






# THE LENTEN JOURNEY

...and why we haven't celebrated Easter yet here in Ukraine...

You will probably notice a lack of Easter in this newsletter, which may come as a surprise to you. With Ukraine being a traditionally Orthodox country, and with the Orthodox church following the Julian calendar, we are still just under a month away from Easter here, which will be celebrated on May 2nd this year. The Julian calendar bases when Easter is off of when Passover is.

That means that here in Ukraine, we are still in the middle of Lent. Lent started with Forgiveness Sunday in March, where active members of the Orthodox church asked forgiveness from those around them for anything that they may have done this past year to hurt them. Interestingly, I found (or a friend shared? I can't quite remember) a little calendar/outline that not only shows the readings for each Sunday, but some activity related to the readings that can be done each day during that week to help remember the verses and/or focus on the Lenten journey. For example, this past Sunday's readings focused on how Jesus told his disciples that in order to follow Him they must "deny themselves, take up their cross and follow him" (Mark 8:34). The suggested activity then was to conscientiously put on your cross each morning, remembering Christ's words.

I am told that when Easter comes here though, it is a celebration like no other. Christmas is often downplayed because of the lingering effects of Communism; however the Communists couldn't take Easter away: the celebration of Christ's triumphant resurrection and defeat of sin and death! I'm told that last year there was a huge Easter Egg exhibit in one of the main squares in the city. I've heard that churches will be packed (although who knows if that will be the case with COVID or not). It is a time of much rejoicing, both as a Ukrainian community and also a Christian community! In fact, some churches here, even ones that aren't Orthodox, celebrate Easter on the same day as the Orthodox do. I am eagerly anticipating getting to celebrate!

# Glimpses of God at work in conversations with students

This week has been a week of glimpsing God at work in students' lives in small ways. What a blessing and exciting thing to be able to witness and share in these moments though!

At the beginning of my language class with the ninth graders, they almost always have a journaling exercise. Sometimes we watch a short video and they have to write about that, other times it's quote, and sometimes it's just one word. On Monday this week, we watched a short video of Marianne Williamson's poem 'Our Deepest Fear.' As we were talking afterwards, one of the students was connecting ideas in the poem with something that they have been learning about in Bible class. Interdisciplinary connections are always fun to witness, when students draw the lines joining things they are learning in one class to things they are discussing in another, but this was all the more exciting to see because this student is not from a Christian home and I know that as a result Bible is a difficult subject for them to understand and keep up in sometimes as a result, even though they are a very good student.

On Tuesday, while waiting for their classmates to join the Google Meet classroom, one of my 4th/5th grade students said, "Miss Groshek, can I ask you a question?" "Of course," I answered.
"There's something I'm not quite sure about," the student
started. "When praying, should we start 'Dear God' or 'Dear
Jesus'" pausing before adding, "I want to say thank you that Jesus
came to Earth." This student also doesn't come from a Christian
family, but said student certainly has a heart for God and believes
and trusts in Him. "You can start either way," I said, "One isn't
better than the other. It's up to you. And neither one is right or
wrong." "Okay," the student replied.

It was also very encouraging to hear later this week that there might be a possibility for a sort of "Bible crash course" in the upcoming school year, for high school students that are starting at the school but don't come from Christian families (this has been a topic of discussion for awhile now). Bible is one of the required subjects for students at the school, but since not all of the students come from Christian families it can be a difficult subject for some students, as they don't have the background knowledge or familiarity with certain more faith related words. Having a class that could serve as an introduction would be such a blessing to these students!
