Catechetical Comments

A Series

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

This month we continue our look at The Close of the Commandments:

What does God say about all these commandments? He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers

to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." [Ex. 20: 5–6]

What does this mean? God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands.

Question 78. What is sin?

Sin is every thought, desire, word, and deed that is contrary to God's Law.

The *Catechism 1991* now takes up the question: "What is sin?" and answers it by saying: "Sin is every thought, desire, word, and deed that is contrary to God's Law." In support of this it lists the following Scripture:

1 John 3:4 – Everyone who makes a practice of sinning also practices lawlessness; sin is lawlessness.

Other names for sin are disobedience (Rom. 5:19); debts (Matt. 6:12); iniquity, transgression (Ex. 34:7); fault (Matt. 18:15); trespass (Rom. 5:17); unrighteousness (Rom. 6:13); and wrong (Col. 3:25).

Disobedience. Debt. Iniquity. Transgression. Fault. Trespass. Unrighteousness. Wrong. These terms all look at sin from a slightly different angle. Let's explore them briefly.

Disobedience. Merriam-Webster says that disobedience is a refusal or neglect to obey. We are disobedient toward God when we either rebel against His law or simply ignore it.

Debt. We owe God our allegiance. When we refuse or neglect to abide by His will, we are in His debt. Scripture says that the debt we owe on account of our sin is death (Rom. 6:23).

Iniquity. This refers to an imbalance in a relationship. Our sin puts us on unequal ground with God – our "even standing" has been fractured because of our disobedience.

Transgression is an infringement upon an implied or expressed set of guidelines, laws, or principles. The law says you cannot exceed a certain speed on a roadway. If you do, you have transgressed that legal limit.

A *fault* is another kind of fracture. It represents a weakness or a failure – either an inability to keep a set standard or a slipping of adherence to that standard. We are incapable of keeping God's law perfectly. Therefore, when we – though we attempt to – fail to do as He expects, we have created a rift in our relationship with Him.


To *trespass* is to go beyond a boundary into areas in which we do not belong. God's law sets boundaries for us. When we violate those boundaries, we trespass His law.

Unrighteousness is the state of being "not right" with God. God, because He is our Creator, has the right to place over us certain expectations, which He has delivered to us in His law. If we were to abide by those expectations, we would be considered to be "right" with Him, or *righteous*.

A *wrong*, according to Merriam-Webster, is an injurious, unfair, or unjust act inflicting harm without due provocation or just cause. Our sin injures God and we are guilty of wrong.

All of these terms together help us understand what's happening when we sin. +

32 black or blue ballpoint pens





Sun Stroke Versus CVA – Do You Know the Difference?



A **brain stroke or CVA**, is a disruption in the blood flow to part of the brain and can occur when a clot cuts off the blood supply to a portion of the brain. The other type of brain stroke is a "brain bleed", or a hemorrhage in the brain.

Symptoms of a brain stroke are easy to recognize:

- Sudden onset of weakness, numbness, or paralysis on one side of the body
- Sudden trouble seeing, speaking, or understanding
- Sudden loss of coordination or balance

The important theme here is sudden. There is no gradual build up to an event like this in the brain. A brain stroke comes on suddenly.

Heat stroke, on the other hand, is the latter stages of heat exposure. The body is exposed to abnormally high temperatures for an extended period of time. This can happen during exercise, or if you are working in an excessively warm environment. Your body becomes unable to cool itself properly.

Other factors that can keep your body from cooling itself properly is lack of fluid intake. Stay hydrated, drink plenty of water if you know you will be putting yourself at risk for heat stroke! Drinking alcohol, caffeine or taking stimulants can increase your risk of heat stroke. The very young and elderly also have a higher risk of suffering from heat stroke.

Symptoms of heat stroke:

- Skin becomes dry and red, clammy
- Nausea and cramping
- Level of consciousness deteriorates
- Confusion to the point of not recognizing they are in danger
- Become unconscious, suffer brain damage and possibly death

Keep in mind that a typical brain stroke happens when the blood flow in the brain is suddenly slowed or stopped completely. Heat stroke from heat exposure develops slower. Feeling clammy, nauseated or cramping are signs you may be in trouble.

As we enjoy the beautiful Wisconsin summer, be aware of your exposure to excessive heat. Stay hydrated, stay safe, and be aware of what your body may be telling you. Know when you are overtaxing your body.

{little ways that God has been involved in conversations}

It shouldn't be surprising that when we invite God to be a part our day and our conversations that He shows up, and yet I am constantly amazed and thankful to see Him do just that. With no classes currently, my weekly routines have been more relaxed and varied, but that it is easier to connect with friends because my schedule isn't as full as it normally would be; and as I spend time with friends here, God continues to show up.

After returning from Georgia, a Ukrainian friend (who's working on her doctorate) reached out to me asking if I would be willing to meet once a week so that she could practice her English: speaking, writing, reading... all of it. Of course, I agreed right away. The other week one of the things we talked about was how society puts so much pressure on people to be a look or behave certain ways and how as a result many people struggle with insecurities. Both of us are Christians, so we also then discussed how God gives us all different gifts and how beautiful the diversity in God's creation is, including in people. That doesn't mean that there's not sin and that we

shouldn't repent of that and work to change; but it ultimately it means our value comes from God.

Three friends/co-workers and I met up for lunch last week, a last get together before our one friend moves to Turkey. As the meal wrapped up, the friend moving looked at each of us and said, "So, how can I pray for you?" And at the end of the meal, we all prayed together and for each other.

An American co-worker and friend had several people over to her family's house for a 4th of July cook out. Before eating, our hostess said, "Sometimes living overseas it's easy to forget to pray for the country you were born in because we're so aware of what's happening in the country we're living in, so I thought it would be good for us to take a minute to pray for the U.S. before we eat" (which is most of the attendees' passport country). So, we went around the table thanking God for the freedom we have and praying for health and healing.
