# CONVERSATIONS FROM THE CLASSROOM

Why do we study the humanities?

As my ninth grade lit class prepared to start reading "Lord of the Flies" by Golding we were talking about the author, who was a professor of humanities before joining the navy in the war. After discussing what subjects the humanities include -- art, music, history, literature, language and philosophy -- I asked the students to take a few minutes and reflect on why do we study the humanities?

Their answers included: we can learn from other's mistakes by studying history and possibly from reading novels, that art and music help us to express ourselves, that the humanities in general can help us learn about right and wrong, that learning these things teaches us about culture. All of these are good answers!

Building off of their answers, we then talked about: how literature and drama help us to be more empathetic, that art and music and language are all means of expression and how these things help us to connect to each other, because God didn't design us to live life alone but in community. We talked about art and music also help us appreciate beauty, and how God created a beautiful word for us to appreciate.

### Chapel and Small Group

Small groups meet the last Wednesday of the month instead of there being a regular Wednesday chapel. Each of the middle through high school classes is divided into groups of boys and girls. The girls are assigned to a female teacher. The boys are assigned to a male teacher. The goal is for these groups to be a place where students feel comfortable and free to ask questions about God or life, a place to share the struggles and joys, and a place for students to grow in their faith.

This is something that was part of the school routine pre-COVID, but last year had to be cancelled because of COVID guidelines, so it's exciting to have them again!

I am with a group of middle schoolers. Because I am the person who dismisses everyone at the end of the day, we knew who each other were; but we've never had classes together, so the first part of this first small group of the year was spent getting to know each other. During the second half though, we got around to reflecting on things we'd been discussing in chapel over the month of September.

The theme of chapel this year is: Jesus loves you. I was interested to learn that all of the girls agreed that of all the messages from the Bible you could share with teens, they thought that this was the most important.

### Isolation and Loneliness can lead to Depression

As we age, circumstances in our lives often change. We retire from a job; friends move away or health issues convince us to eliminate or restrict driving. When changes like these occur; we may not fully realize how they will affect our ability to stay connected and engaged and how much they can impact our overall health and well-being. What are the factors that put you at a great risk of isolation? 1) living alone; 2) mobility or sensory impairment; 3) major life transitions or losses; 4) low income or limited financial resources; 5) being a caregiver for someone with a serious

condition; 6) psychological or cognitive challenges; 7) inadequate social support; 8) rural, unsafe and/or inaccessible neighborhood; 9) transportation access challenges; 10) language barriers; and 11) age, racial, ethnic, sexual orientation and/or gender identity barriers.

We need social connection to thrive-no matter what our age-but recent research shows that the negative health consequences of chronic isolation and loneliness may be especially harmful for older adults. Older adults who describe themselves as lonely have a 59% greater risk of functional decline and a 45% greater risk of death. An estimated one in five adults over age 50-at least 8 million-are affected by isolation. Prolonged isolation can be as bad for your health as smoking 15 cigarettes a day. Other negative health conditions that occur from prolonged isolation and loneliness are: chronic health conditions such as heart disease, a weakened immune system, depression and anxiety, dementia (including Alzheimer's disease), admission to nursing homes and overuse of emergency services, and even death.

The good news is that with greater awareness, we can take steps to maintain and strengthen our ties to family and friends, expand our social circles and become more involved in the community around us. Having a social network that meets our needs means different things to each of us. We hope that this information we are discussing helps to motivate you to evaluate your situation and, if needed, take action to strengthen the relationships that matter the most to you. Don't forget-when you open up your world to new people, sharing your time, talents and wisdom, it's a win-win for you and your entire community.



Here are some actions you may want to consider taking to help you stay ahead of the "connection curve:"

- Invite people over for coffee or call them to suggest a trip to a museum or to see a movie
- Schedule a time each day to call a friend or visit someone
- · Meet your neighbors-young and old
- Don't let being a non-driver stop you from staying active. Find out your transportation options. (Making the Ride Happen – open Mon-Fri 8:30 am-4:30 pm, 888-200-0576)
- Use social media, like Facebook, to stay in touch with long-distance friends or write an old-fashioned letter
- Stay physically active and include group exercise in the mix, like joining a walking club
- · Take a class to learn something new and, at the same time, expand your circle of friends
- · Revisit an old hobby you've set aside and connect with others who share your interests
- Volunteer to deepen your sense of purpose and help others
- Visit your local community wellness or senior center and become involved in a wide range of interesting programs
- Check out faith-based organizations for spiritual engagement, as well as to participate in activities and events
- Get involved in your community by taking on a cause, such as making your community more age-friendly.

"Where Does Thankfulness Come From?" Luke 17:11-19

A typical Thanksgiving sermon goes something like this: We should be thankful. We are not thankful - or, not enough anyway. So be thankful! Amen.

That doesn't work very well, though. We know what we should do. We know how we should be. But why are we like that? Why do many fail at thanksgiving every other day but Thanksgiving? Why has the art of the thank you note vanished? Why do we so often forget to give thanks, for one another, for what we have been given?

Perhaps the answer lies in what makes Thanksgiving Day so successful one day a year. What happens on this day that makes it special and unique and sets it apart from all other days?

Well, it is, they say, the busiest travel time of the year. People go home. We go to be with family. We leave our isolation and our inward focus for a day or two to be with others and focus on them. We share ourselves and give of ourselves. On this day, time isn't the enemy or something to beat, but something to share. We make an effort for others - to cook for them, to be there with them, to tell them that we appreciate them. And it's right. It feels right. Like the way things should be. Because it is.

So, it seems that thankfulness is something we cannot do well by ourselves in isolation. Thankfulness is best done with others, is best shared with others, and when we share with others - sharing ourselves and what we have.

Which is why, I think, in our increasingly individualistic and isolated world, where friends are virtual, names are a list in our contacts, phones are answered by machines or voice mail, and conversation is by text . . . where we are together less and less, no wonder thankfulness is such a rare commodity these days.

But it's not only that we have squeezed each other out of our lives - how often does God, too, get squeezed out? Our knowledge of the world and how things work in nature and medicine and science means that God is not looked to so much anymore for what we need. The rain doesn't come from God but from that low pressure system making its way across the country. The harvest comes from genetically engineered seeds, precision GPS guided plowing and reaping, and well-timed irrigation. My healing comes from a pill or an operation or stem cells re-creating in our bodies what time and disease have taken away. And in such a picture, God is so very far away - from my thoughts, from my life, from my reality. He is not in my mind, and so am I even in His? And so giving thanks? Well, it's just not in the picture.

But then something goes wrong. Rains become floods, the harvest comes in short, the medicine doesn't work, and sickness becomes death. And then we wonder why is God so far away? But that's where we've put Him, isn't it?

But then what happens? Communities come together to help those effected by natural disaster. We give to the needy. Families come together to mourn. And thanksgiving blossoms again, in the midst of struggle and hurt. Because in the midst of these we are forced out of our individual and isolated lives and put together again. And we focus on others. We share ourselves and give of ourselves. We make an effort for others. And it's right. It feels right. Like the way things should be. Because it is.

It's why people who have lost everything are often so thankful. In the midst of something gone horribly wrong, there is something right. And we see the hand of God at work for us. The hand that wasn't not there before - it most certainly was. We were just blinded to it. By our sin. By our stuff. By our success. By our bounty. So how fortunate when what is blinding us is then taken away, and we see again. And give thanks.

Perhaps that is what happens on Thanksgiving. Or at least, part of it. We see again. We see each other again. As not just as a name on a list or a friend with a like, but as gifts from God.

And so it was on the road that day that marked the border between Samaria and Galilee. A traveler came and broke the isolation of ten lepers. God in the flesh, come to be with His people. Not a God far away, but a God near. To share Himself and give of Himself. To give healing and life. And a Samaritan, an outsider among the Jews and an outcast because of his leprosy, got not only the gift of healing, but a family of faith. Someone who came to be with Him. And so there is thanks.

And it is this same God in the flesh, God with us, who then traveled the road to Jerusalem, to give more. To ascend the cross to give Himself and His life for us. For the forgiveness of our sins. That we be His family of faith. To be not a God far away (which, in fact, He never is), but a God near. God with us.

And so, this same God of life comes to be with us. God in flesh and blood, come to be with us. Our God now preached into our ears and placed into our mouths. To share of Himself and give of Himself. To give us the healing of forgiveness and life eternal. And we sinners receive not only these gifts, but a family of faith. And so there is thanks. Thanks be to God!

Thankfulness that we then share with others. Not because it is a rule or something we have to do, but because that's what thankfulness does. It is not an isolated thing, but a shared thing. It is joy that is shared. It is giving what we have received. It is living in the image of God. And we know, this is right. The way things should be.

It is what the Philippians did with Paul. Paul didn't ask for their help, but they couldn't do otherwise. And though far apart in distance, they were close in heart and

faith. And so there is giving, sharing, thanksgiving.

And so it is good that we have a day set aside for this, to help us see again. To help us learn again thankfulness and how it is. A day not to be the only day of thanksgiving, but the first of many. The model that can help us make everyday a day of thanksgiving and a life of thanksgiving. A day to see again the God who is near, the God who has given us all, and who won't stop. So that we, too, can give of ourselves and share ourselves and so regain the thankfulness and joy we seem to so often lose. Or at least misplaced. Until we see our place in Jesus again. Until we see His place on the cross again, where all is made right again. The way things should be. Right with God in Jesus, so we can be right with each other in love.

And we bless the Lord for His steadfast love.

In the Name of the Father, and of the + Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

### Catechetical Comments

A Series

### THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

This month we continue our look at The Close of the Commandments:

What does God say about all these commandments? He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." [Ex. 20: 5–6]

What does this mean? God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands.

Question 82. What has original sin done to human nature?

Original sin

A. has brought guilt and condemnation to all people

The *Catechism 1991* now poses this question: "What has original sin done to human nature?" It answers the question first by saying that original sin "has brought guilt and condemnation to all people."

In support of this it sets forth the following Scripture passages:

**Rom. 5:19** – By the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners.

**Eph. 2:3** – [We] were by nature children of wrath, like the rest of mankind.

*Original* sin has not only left an indelible mark upon mankind, it has repositioned our entire race in relation to God, separating us from the natural intimacy we once enjoyed.

Imagine being born to royalty. The Queen was your grandmother, the Prince and Heir to the Throne your father. You awoke each day

to palatial surroundings and played upon the knees of the most powerful people in all the land. Your wishes and desires held the attention of those who could fulfill all your cravings with a snap of their fingers. Oh, what a world you were born into!

But one day an evil thought entered your juvenile brain and shattered your innocense. You not only wanted to be cared for by the heirs of power; you wanted to *be* the heir of power. Indeed, you wanted that power for yourself . . . and you wanted it *now*. And you were willing to take drastic action to get it.

What do you think would happen if your desire to unseat the ruling authorities were to become known? *Banishment* just might be the result of your murderous intentions. *Treason* would be the charge and *death* would be the penalty. You and all your descendants would lose forever the gilded life you had lived.

This is what happened in the Garden. Adam and Eve, who once walked with God, rebelled against Him and lost the position of favor the King once lavished upon them. They, and all their descendants were banished from the presence of God.

But, wait! There's more to our story.

It was no dispassionate ruler from whom your actions had separated you. No, it was your own family, your own blood, those who

loved you from the day you were born. What would Grandmother the Queen not do to restore you? As hurtful as your evil thoughts toward her may have been, the thought of losing you forever would be unbearable. Plans would be made, actions would be taken, to bring you back into the family.

Of course, there would be a price. The Law is the law, and without it chaos reigns, putting the entire kingdom in jeopardy. No, this would have to be done in the proper way. Simply pretending that nothing had happened would not suffice. You wanted the death of Grandma the Queen and your parents. This could not go unpunished. A crime so severe requires a punishment as severe. Oh, what a dilemma your sin had created!

Of course, we know how God solved the dilemma the sin of Adam and Eve created. Yes, the punishment had to be meted out in order to avoid the chaos of lawlessness, but their restoration and that of their descendants had to be procured. What was God our Father to do?

Forward stepped the eternal Son, who offered to suffer the punishment on our behalf, thus satisfying divine justice, preserving good order in the kingdom, and restoring the lost to their loving God.

It was an ingenious plan! It was not without its challenges, however. Jesus, God's only Son, had to take our punishment, to suffer the agony of the cross and the grave. It was an unimaginably gruesome ordeal, but it was necessitated by two things: 1) the sinful rebellion of mankind, and 2) the unsurmountable love of our gracious God and Father. Abiding lawlessness was not an option, but neither was living without us.

*Original* sin put God in a terrible predicament. It took tenacious love, divine genius, and the willingness of our Eternal Elder Brother, Jesus, to mend what sin had torn.
