Catechetical Comments

A Series

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

This month we continue our look at The Close of the Commandments:

What does God say about all these commandments? He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." [Ex. 20: 5–6]

What does this mean? God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands.

Question 82. What has original sin done to human nature?

Original sin

B. has left everyone without true fear and love of God, that is, spiritually blind, dead, and enemies of God

The *Catechism 1991* has posed the question: "What has original sin done to human nature?" And it continues its answer by saying that original sin "has left everyone without true fear and love of God, that is, spiritually blind, dead, and enemies of God."

In support of this it sets forth the following Scripture passages:

Gen. 8:21 – The intention of man's heart is evil from his youth.

1 Cor. 2:14 – The natural person does not accept the things of the Spirit of God, for they are folly to him, and he is not able to understand them because they are spiritually discerned.

Eph. 2:1 – You were dead in the trespasses and sins.

Rom. 8:7 – The mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God, for it does not submit to God's law; indeed, it cannot.

Not only has *Original* sin left mankind in a state of guilt and condemnation, it has also created a situation where, in our natural sinful condition, we're okay with that.

What difference does it make to me if someone I couldn't care less about criticizes me? If I don't care about them, I'm certainly not going to give a second thought to how they feel about me or the things I do.

And this is not mere speculation on my part. There are voices in secular society that I simply don't listen to. I couldn't tell you the last time I listened to the network news, for instance. I just don't care what they say. I'm not listening.

Many people do this with God. They just don't want to hear what He has to say, so they're not listening.

On the other hand, if I do care for the person speaking, if I have a personal relationship with them, what they say matters to me.

This is why Luther says that original sin has cut us to our very core, severing our connection to God and cutting off our ability truly to fear, love, and trust in Him.

It would be easy, of course, to presume that this has obliterated any relationship we could have with God. But it hasn't. Our relationship with God certainly still exists, but it's not a good one. Boxers in a ring have a relationship with one another, but it's not a good one. It's a relationship built on a common desire to punch one another's lights out.

Now, if these two combatants were fairly matched, that would be one thing. But, when it comes to our relationship of animosity with God, that would be like me getting into a boxing ring with the current heavyweight champion (Oleksandr Usyk or Tyson Fury). The fight wouldn't last long, and I'd be blessed even to come out alive!

But, if I weren't paying attention, I wouldn't know how dangerous that would be. I'd be virtually blind to the fact that my very life would be on the line. I may as well be dead, because I would not be heeding my own body's warning about how great a threat that would be to me. And Oleksandr would have every reason to flatten me because my disrespect and disregard of him would make us enemies. (Insult me, if you wish, but, by all means, do *not* ignore me!)

We have no idea of the threatening situation

we're putting ourselves in by disrespecting and disregarding God. What kind of an enemy do we think we're fooling with here? This is God! He could blow us out of existence with a single puff of His nostrils. But, in our sinful state, we don't know that because we're also blind. We're standing toe-to-toe with Almighty God and we can't even see what we're up against.

The fact that God doesn't box the life out of us is a great example of His mercy and compassion. He could squash us like bugs, but He chose instead to love us and to take the squashing we deserve and inflict it on His own Son.

The mercy of God is what reaches across the ring and switches the lights on, enabling us to see how great a God He really is. When He awakens our faith through His Means of Grace He helps us not only see what a threat He could be, but also what a loving, gracious God He is. And that's what changes everything.

HEART ATTACK WARNING SIGNS

Some heart attacks are sudden and intense, but most of them start slowly, with mild pain or discomfort. Here are signs that can mean a heart attack is happening:

- Chest discomfort. Most heart attacks involve discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes, or that goes away and comes back. It can feel like uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain.
- Discomfort in other areas of the upper body. Symptoms can include pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.
- Shortness of breath. This feeling often comes along with chest discomfort. But it can also occur without chest discomfort.
- Other signs may include breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.

If you or someone you're with has one or more of these signs, call 9-1-1 immediately.

Get to the hospital right away.

If you're the one having symptoms, and you can't access the emergency medical services (EMS), have someone drive you to the hospital right away. Don't drive yourself, unless you have absolutely no other option.

Stroke is a medical emergency. Every second counts, because time lost is brain lost! Know these stroke warning signs and share them with others:

Sudden numbness or weakness of the face. arm or leg, especially on one side of the body.

Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding.

Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes.

Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination.

Sudden, severe headache with no known cause.

If you or someone with you has one or more of these signs, don't delay! Call 9-1-1 or the emergency medical services (EMS) number immediately so an ambulance — ideally with advanced life support — can come. Also, check the time so you'll know when the first symptoms appeared. It's important to take immediate action. If given within three hours of the start of symptoms, a clot-busting drug can reduce long-term disability for the most common type of stroke.


Older adults: No one is too old to enjoy the benefits of regular physical activity. Evidence indicates that muscle-strengthening exercises can reduce the risk of falling and breaking bones and can improve the ability to live alone.

Parents and children: Parents can help their children maintain a physically active lifestyle by providing positive feedback and opportunities for physical activity. Families can plan outings and events that allow and encourage everyone in the family to be active.

Teenagers: Regular physical activity improves strength, builds lean muscle and decreases body fat. Activity can build stronger bones to last a lifetime.

Staying active during winter with indoor activities:

- Dancing, (Greek, Hula, Flamenco, Middle Eastern and Swing)
- · Riding a stationary bike
- · Actively playing with children
- Taking Jazzercise
- Scrubbing the floor
- · Playing basketball, shooting hoops
- Walking at a brisk pace (mall/around a track/treadmill)
- · Doing water aerobics
- Jogging/walking combination (In a 30-minute period, you should be jogging for less than 10 minutes.)



Eat More Veggies!

Almost Everyone Needs to Eat More Fruits and Vegetables. A growing body of research shows that fruits and vegetables are critical to promoting good health. To get the amount that's recommended, most people need to increase the amount of fruits and vegetables they currently eat every day.

Fruits and Vegetables Can Protect Your Health.

Fruits and vegetables contain essential vitamins, minerals and fiber that may help protect you from chronic diseases.

Compared with people who consume a diet with only small amounts of fruits and vegetables, those who eat more generous amounts as part of a healthful diet are likely to have reduced risk of chronic diseases, including stroke and perhaps other cardiovascular diseases, and certain cancers.

Whole Foods or Supplements?

Nutrients Should Come Primarily From Foods.

Foods such as fruits and vegetables contain not only the vitamins and minerals that are often found in supplements, but also other naturally occurring substances that may help protect you from chronic diseases.

For some people, fortified foods or supplements can be helpful in getting the nutrients their bodies need. A fortified food contains a nutrient in an amount greater than what is typically found in that food, for example calcium fortified orange juice.

- -They are nomadic herders of goats, sheep and camels in the arid region of northern Kenya.
- -Although there are Christian congregations in Samburu, the Gospel has become mixed with African Traditional Religions, hiding the truth about Jesus.
- -"African Traditional Religions" are syncretistic meaning they mix together the parts of religions that please them.
- -Kelvin's concern is that his people are being led astray by these people and their beliefs.
- -The Samburu need to hear the truth of the Gospel of the free grace of God in Jesus Christ.

A Conversation with Kelvin



Kelvin, a Pastoral Student at Matongo, from the Samburu Region of Kenya

I sat down with Kelvin Lenasayan to learn more about him, how he came to seminary, and about his people—the Samburu.

How did the Gospel first come to the Samburu People?

In 1948, missionaries arrived and established mission stations in the rural areas. Then, in 1982, Lutheran missionaries arrived, establishing two stations, one in my home of Ngilai and another further north.

How has the Gospel fared among the Samburu?

Beginning in 2000, "Pentecostals" began to proselytise. They confuse people by adding African Traditional Religions to the Gospel. So now, I can say, with that most Samburu have not heard the pure Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. They still cling to their traditional beliefs and way of worship. That is a big problem.

Tell me about your father.

Yes, my father was called Kilaikon. He was a respected community elder. When the Lutheran missionaries came, he was already married to four wives. He was the first man to welcome them. He heard the Gospel and liked it so much. He requested they baptise him and his household. He was given his Baptismal name: Lazarus. He became a very active churchman. He even showed them where to build the church building. It is there to this day. He entered glory 2008.

So what was the motivation for you to come to seminary?

Actually, at first, I did not want to become a pastor. I wanted a white-collar job. The Church barely pays its pastors. But my people said that I should. So I came. After...

... two months I left. But then I became convinced that this was the Lord's will. So I came back and finished the Certificate Program.

And now you are back for the Diploma!

Yes, my parish encouraged me to return for more training. So now I can study Greek and Hebrew and be a better pastor for my people. I will be much grounded in the Bible and Lutheran Theology.

When you finish your studies for the Diploma in Theology. Where do you see yourself serving?

I believe that I will be going back to serve in the rural parts of the Samburu. And I will have a big task, because I am the only trained man there. Samburu is a very big geographical area. So I believe I am going to be working there.

My heart is in the rural parts of the Samburu.

Elementary school chapel

In elementary school chapel, the students are talking about the miracles of Jesus; and I was asked if I would talk about Jesus turning water into wine.

"What is a miracle?" I asked the students. Hands shot up into the air. I called on one of them. One of the many nice things about dismissal is that I'm able to call on almost all of the students by name. "It's like a super power," the student answered. This answer made me smile. "And who has this super power?" I asked. Hands shot up again. I called on someone else. "Jesus," the student replied.

After telling the story of the first miracle -- Jesus turning water into wine -- I said, "Today I have with me -- 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 -- five things." I held each object up as I counted. "Now, I'm going to need five special helpers to decide if these things are needs (gesturing to one side) or wants (gesturing to the other)." Hands shot up. For each thing, I asked my special helpers to explain why it was a need or a want. After the last object had placed in one of the two piles, I said, "Today's story reminds us that God provides for our needs, not always how we expect, but he always provides. "

And we closed with a prayer before classes headed back to their classroom.

Conversations during tutoring

This year I've had the opportunity to tutor -- more accurately to be an English conversation partner with -- two different adults. A friend of mine (from the Georgia trip in the summer) reached out to me at the end of the summer asking if I would consider tutoring a friend of hers who wanted to improve their spoken English, and then a couple of months ago this same friend asked if I had time in my schedule to set some aside each week so that she could practice her English as well.

You can live each day to the fullest.'" This is beautiful, gentle advice. It reminded me of Ecclesiastes 3:11-13, "He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the human heart; yet no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end. I know that there is nothing better for people than to be happy and to do good while they live. That each of them may eat and drink, and find satisfaction in all their toil—this is the gift of God." These verses always remind me of being thankful for each day.
